Paul, Minn. Delegates voted to return the revisions to the Ethics Committee for additional review and chapter input.

A draft of the ethics code was distributed at the October Fort Worth chapter meeting, which featured an address by SPJ national President Kelly Hawes. For a copy of the ethics code, call Verlie Edwards at 336-5165 or 441-8458.
