A 30-year veteran of the Star-Telegram, Tinsley served 10 of those years as executive editor, during which time the newspaper won two Pulitzer Prizes



(1981 and 1985).

A key staff writer in the S-T's coverage of the JFK assassination, Tinsley has won numerous awards, including a National Education Writers' first place for a 1965 series titled "Academic Freedom in Texas."

Tinsley is executive producer of the 1993 Texas Gridiron Show and is immediate past president of SPJ.

He is an inductee into the C.E. Shuford Journalism Hall of Honor at the University of North Texas, where he also is a member of the journalism advisory council. He currently chairs the Sam Houston State Journalism Advisory Council.

Tinsley is a 3-time judge of Lufkin's Southern Hushpuppy Olympics, once having been paired with that noted anti-bordello crusader, Marvin Zindler of "Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" fame. He has been a judge for several years of Athens' Miss Blackeyed Pea Beauty Pageant.

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A man of cunning and dexterity, Tinsley has met and shaken hands with every U.S. president since General Dwight Eisenhower.

The writing legacy continues in that every member of his immediate family is a journalist; wife Anne Miller is a writer, son Ben is a police reporter with the Amarillo Globe-News and daughter Anna is courts reporter with the Odessa American.
